Course Description:

In this course, you will be introduced to the diverse methods and subject matters of philosophy. The course will take the form of a historical survey of important philosophical texts, which will begin with works from the start of the 4^{th} Century BCE, and will end with works from the second half of the 20^{th} Century.

Exams:

Two exams, a midterm and a final, will be given. Each will be worth 20% of the final grade. Both will be given online, and will be open-book and open-note exams. The midterm will be available for you to take starting on Monday, 3/4 and will be due at the end of Friday, 3/8, while the final will be available starting Saturday, 5/4, and will be due on Monday, 5/6, which is the officially scheduled day for our final exam. Missed exams cannot be made up.

Ouizzes:

Beginning with week 2, you'll be assigned one online quiz for pretty much every week of the semester, which you will take on Canvas and which will be due at the end of the Friday of that week. The quizzes will include questions about all of the material that we will cover that

week, and will be fairly short; there will be only about five to seven questions on each quiz, and they will usually be multiple-choice. You'll have roughly one minute per question to complete these quizzes, and while you can use your book and class notes to complete the quiz you will have to use the "LockDown Browser" on Canvas to take it (which prevents you from using other browsers or windows while you're using the browser).

You will be assigned 12 quizzes over the course of the semester. Missed quizzes cannot be made up under any circumstances, but I will drop the lowest two quiz scores for every student. Each of your top ten quizzes will count, then, and since each quiz counts for 3% of your total score, 30% of your grade will come from quizzes.

Group Assignments:

Periodically, I will break the class up into groups and have each group complete a short worksheet assignment. You will be assigned 8 such worksheets total, and I will drop the lowest two scores for each student; each of the 6 remaining assignments will count for 5% of your total grade, so like your quizzes, 30% of your total grade will come from these group assignments. Missed group assignments cannot be made up.
